

CirculART, Circular Cambridge... What is all this circular stuff about?

At the moment our consumption follows a linear model in which we buy → use → throw away. The landfill and pollution problems that are arising from our one way system are making us realise that there is no 'away'. And it's not just a waste problem, a whopping 40% of our personal carbon emissions arise from the things we buy.

Charity shops, creatives that use upcycled materials, repairers, engineers designing products that last and can be remanufactured, websites that allow people to easily rent, borrow and resell their unwanted items are all part of a circular economy.

In a circular world:

- Waste is viewed simply as a resource in the wrong place – in this way, the goods of today become the resources of tomorrow.
We work all resources and things as hard as possible, some resources might be used 4 or 5 times, others could go on and on.
We rethink ownership and seek to use and access those things we want and need by sharing, swapping and renting more. Sharing cities around the world are experimenting with ways for their citizens live well with less stuff.


